N Friday night night yours truly, Uncritic #001, fired up the olde Hansom Cab and headed south to the small town of Cleburne, Texas. Just like every other theatre in a 1,000 mile radius, The Plaza Theatre Company is staging "Baskervilles: A Sherlock Holmes Mystery". This will be the 5th time for me to review the production. It is my humble opinion that every time, with every review, it will be worth the ink and paper because it is just that intriguing.

raffic was uneventful on the journey down and I arrived with plenty of time before curtain call. There was an excellent turnout. This theatre has seats facing north, south, east, and west with the square stage in the middle. Each section has about 75 seats, so 300 seats and tonight it was about 75% capacity. The diagonal runways made for easy entrances and exits. There is a circle inside the square stage that rotates. This was used brilliantly for the train ride from London to Dartmoor. The actors sat down in at the station in London, rotated 360 degrees, and stood up in Dartmoor.

Spoiler alert, Sherlock Holmes is a ginger named Quentin Scott and does an excellent job keeping Dr Watson, Tyler Cox from drifting too far afield or amoor, as the case may be. Actors 1 and 2 (Jesse Bowron and Tyler Krumm) and actress 1 (Abby Watson)



fill the other 30+ roles flawlessly. When the scenes call for Carwright and street urchins, the cast brought members house down with the use articial leas. Stapleton, while chasing butterflies, has butterfly attached his pith-helmet which he turns around as speaks to Dr. Watson. Sir Henry is once again from Texas instead of Canada. Director Freddy Martinez has interpreted Mr. Ludwig's script and created a vastly unique

production that still familiar.

t is our (The Sherlockian Theatrical Society) sworn duty to go to as many Sherlockian plays as possible and as many theaters as we can. To members of our society (STS) seeing the same play over and over at different place is still very pleasing. Every interpretation has its own merits.
